Outdoor Nativity



The annual Outdoor Nativity took place on Sunday 9th December and this time we were greatly blessed with excellent weather. A group from the local Churches re-enacted the Christmas story. This year we started on North Road in front of the old TH Green's building as the car park of the Bay Horse has now been built upon.

There was ample space on North Road for the angel Gabriel to visit Mary and Joseph and for them to begin their journey to Bethlehem. As usual Hazel and Tony

provided the donkey and the journey began with the narrator Emma adding the usual touch of local humour to the tale. Many local people were there to add to the crowd journeying to Bethlehem.

First stop was the King's Head where there was no room at the inn and then on to the Black Bull where the kindly landlord allowed Mary and Joseph the use of his stable in the park.

The action then moved to the "Hillside outside Bethlehem" where the dirty, smelly shepherds were tending their sheep. Again Gabriel and lots of other young angels appeared to bring the news of Jesus' birth and to tell the shepherds to go down to the stable and see for themselves as they duly did.

By this time Mary and Joseph were settled in the stable with the baby who unfortunately did not lie gently sleeping in a manger. Joseph tried unsuccessfully to calm her so a quick swap was effected with a replacement doll before the visitors arrived. The shepherds came, followed by the Magi from afar with their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

Throughout the journey Emma the narrator had been telling the story interspersed with appropriate carols ably led by Kath Morris and with all the crowd joining in.

One visitor this year was Bishop Toby, Area Bishop of Bradford who gave the blessing at the end, thanked everyone involved and said how much he was impressed by the local community spirit.

Mulled wine and mince pies were served afterwards in Sutton Baptist Church and many local people joined us there. It was estimated that three to four hundred people watched the nativity and collections were made for Shelter, the homeless charity.

Thanks are due to Laura Warren who produced the nativity, Rob Harris and his team for sound and lighting and all who took part, acting, marshalling and organising behind the scenes. We all look forward to next year when once again Christ will come to Sutton.

Sister Wendy Beckett, Expert on Art

This celebrated nun died on Boxing Day this year. She had become famous after Delia Smith, (devout Catholic & writer of cook books) was impressed by her notes on Art. Most of her notes had been on pictures which she had only seen in reproduction. Delia Smith persuaded the Catholic Herald to publish Sister Wendy's writings. This was followed by a successful TV BBC series in the 1990's, and by two series for US viewers in 2001-02.

She lived since 1970, alone for the most part, in a small caravan in the grounds of a community of Carmelites in Norfolk, only communicating with them by note. Her caravan was small, cold and basic. She collected her food daily from the nuns, went to bed at 6pm and rose at 1am, the best time for prayer and contemplation. She said she only agreed to make the Series for the BBC in order to make a financial contribution to the monastery for her keep.

She was once asked what she felt about God. She replied, "I don't think anyone can feel God. Those who believe in him most are most aware of his non-feelability, as it were. God is such a total mystery. My heart sinks when the word God is bandied around glibly."

Planning

The proposed *Aire Valley Incinerator* has received planning permission, but has yet to prove that everything complies with the regulations.

The *Skipton – Colne Railway* is looking promising and there is a possibility that the *M65 motorway* could be extended across the Pennines into Yorkshire and may go north of Cross Hills to Skipton.

Roads and paths

Gullies and drains are cleaned and mended. A specification for work at Arbour Top is ready and quotes sought – as are quotes for the path at Lower Arbour.

Library

£252 will be sent to help fund the *South Craven Community Library*. This figure is based on the proportion of people from Farnhill who use the service.

The Birds in Your Garden

Tawny Owls



Have you heard Tawny Owls calling near you?

Although their distribution has changed little over the last 40 years, Breeding Bird Survey data suggest that their population is declining. To confirm this the BTO is running a survey for all to take part in. Find it at http://tinyurl.com/tawny-survey

It is designed as an on-line project to keep costs down, but if you don't have a computer or smart-phone, maybe a relative or neighbour has.

By listening out for Tawny Owls in your garden you could help the BTO understand their calling behaviour and distribution, and discover the impact of urbanisation and artificial lighting. So far over 8,500 people have registered for the Calling Survey, so they're well on the way to their 10,000 target.

It's easy to take part - just listen for 20 minutes during at least one evening



between now and 31 March 2019. You can listen from your garden, local park or woodland. You can even listen whilst lying in bed with the window open! All your records are valuable: the BTO is particularly keen on knowing about zero counts, because where owls aren't is as important as where they are!

If you enjoy taking part, you can keep going: the more weeks you can listen the better. Gaps between weeks don't matter.

But did you know that a Tawny Owl doesn't really call "twit twoo"? The "twit" or more accurately "ke-wick" is a contact call and the "twoo" or again more accurately "hoo-hoo-oooo" is the male's territorial call. Consequently, if you hear "ke-wick hoo-hoo-oooo" it is most likely a male answering a female. If you are not sure what a Tawny Owl call sounds like, there are recordings on the BTO website.

You can listen out any time between sunset and midnight. If you hear a Tawny Owl outside the survey period, you can record that too. Just enter your results

online, though if you'd prefer to do so on paper, you can, by emailing gbw@bto.org or phoning 01842 750050.

Tawny Owls prefer nesting in woodlands, but will also breed in larger rural and suburban gardens. Our most familiar owl, it is found throughout mainland Britain, and its hooting can be heard from late autumn right through the winter months, underlining that this is a species that breeds early in the year.

They tend to be localised, as their need for suitable tree cavities or nest boxes for breeding will limit their numbers, and young birds don't go far afield, most only moving a few kilometres to find a territory.

Established pairs remain on their breeding territory all year and are very protective of it, as it helps them find prey in years when small mammal numbers are low. It is defended with territorial calls which are often backed up with visual displays. Territorial activity increases in early autumn, when young birds seek to establish territories of their own, and continues into late winter.

The first eggs can be laid in February, though most birds will not start laying until mid-March or later. Incubation starts with the first egg, leading to asynchronous hatching – a strategy which increases the survival chances of at least some chicks if feeding conditions prove challenging.

Although Tawny Owls feed mostly on small mammals, mice and voles, they will also take small birds, amphibians, large insects and earthworms – the latter from short grass on damp nights, when the worms are foraging above ground. They have even been known to take goldfish from garden ponds and bats emerging from their roosts.
