

Monday 15th April. Meditation Walk

Get Holy Week off to a wonderful start by joining us on a silent, meditative walk to the Kildwick cross, starting at 10am from St Andrew's Church, Kildwick. The walk will be at a gentle pace and no more than 3 miles, but there is a steady climb of about 500' over some rough ground.

If coming by car you can park in St Andrew's Church car park. If coming by bus catch the 66 from Keighley at 9.34 getting off just before the A629 roundabout and walking through the underpass to Kildwick.

At the cross there will be a stop for any refreshments you may like to bring, followed by a short meditation. If the weather is poor on the 15th please ring Barbara on 01535 635620 before setting out, as we could postpone the walk to Thursday 18th if necessary.

June 8th BUILDING DEMENTIA FRIENDLY CHURCHES.

8 June, 10am-4pm at George Armitage House, Burton Leonard, HG3 3SD

A workshop for clergy and lay leaders in ministering to people with Dementia and their carers

This course is provided free of charge with support from Dementia Forward and Ripon Cathedral. This very practical course is designed to enable church leaders to learn more about dementia and the possible ways in which they could help their churches to become more welcoming, inclusive and nurturing to all who enter their doors, including people who have dementia and those who care for them.

Course aims:

- To provide the learner with a better understanding by what is meant by the term 'dementia' what is happening to the brain and why, and how the disease may impact the sufferer, their carers, and those around them.
- To stimulate the learner to consider the Theology of Dementia where is God for the people whose lives are effected by dementia, and the importance of how the church can reinforce their identity as a valued members of God's Kingdom.
- To identify successful methods of engaging with and nurturing the spiritual journey of those with dementia and those who care for them; including creating meaningful worship and supportive visiting.
- To provide each learner with practical activities to help them to determine the most appropriate way forward for their church in meeting the needs of those effected by dementia.
- To identify support materials and services available to help churches as they develop their ministry to people with dementia and their carers.

The course leaders will be Reverend Dan Sladden from Ripon Cathedral, Jill Quinn and Debby Lennox of Dementia Forward, and Gaynor Hammond, a Baptist minister and author with many years of experience working as a Dementia Project Worker, working closely with the Christian Council on Aging and Methodist Homes (MHA)

Sayings from the week and wisdom from the tradition

As followers of Christ we must take a bold step. We must shed the "enemy image" we have of those who persecute us. Because the moment we have an enemy image of anyone God's love can no longer work through us to reach them. We must pray for even love those who hate us.

First Reading - 1 Corinthians 10: 1-13

I do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud, and all passed through the sea, and all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea, and all ate the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink. For they drank from the spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was Christ. Nevertheless, God was not pleased with most of them, and they were struck down in the wilderness.

Now these things occurred as examples for us, so that we might not desire evil as they did. Do not become idolaters as some of them did; as it is written, 'The people sat down to eat and drink, and they rose up to play.' We must not indulge in sexual immorality as some of them did, and twenty-three thousand fell in a single day. We must not put Christ to the test, as some of them did, and were destroyed by serpents. And do not complain as some of them did, and were destroyed by the destroyer. These things happened to them to serve as an example, and they were written down to instruct us, on whom the ends of the ages have come. So if you think you are standing, watch out that you do not fall. No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it.

Gospel Reading -Luke 13: 1-9

There were some present who told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. He asked them, 'Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them - do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did.'

Then he told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. So he said to the gardener, "See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?" He replied, "Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig around it and put manure on it. If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down."
