New beginnings

September is forever associated with new beginnings. It's imprinted in us from our school days onwards. Each September marks the start of a new school year, the formal marker in time of progress and moving on to the next stage in our lives. Some Septembers are more significant than others – the one where we started school for the first time, or moved from one school to another, or, for some of us, when we left the security of home for the first time and took our first tentative steps into the wider world of higher education. Even now,

decades later, the beginning of September carries potent emotional resonance: regret at the loss of the summer just past, balanced against nervousness and excitement about what the immediate future holds.

This September is a time of new beginnings for the

churches I serve in Kildwick, Cononley and Bradley. From September 1st, what were previously two separate Church of England parishes become one new parish – the parish of Kildwick, Cononley and Bradley. My title changes too – I will no longer be priest-in-charge, but Vicar of this new entity.

What difference will it make? In some ways, none. The churches have been adapting to life with one priest in place of two for the last 21 months. It's not always been an easy process, necessitating changes to service times and a reduction in priest-led worship which many churchgoers have found difficult. But the vast majority have accepted the need for change and worked hard to cope gracefully with



the disruption. And out of that need for change have already grown some positive benefits. One service a month at Cononley is now led by people from the church, and from

But forget all that it is nothing compared to what I am going to do September the same will be happening at Kildwick. From October, there will be a monthly Messy Church service at Kildwick, providing a great opportunity for all ages to worship and learn together, enjoying both each other's company, and delicious food!

The change could be seen as simply legal and technical, with no practical impact on each church's day-today working. It's certainly true that each church will continue to do what it does best - being a blessing in the villages where they are placed, offering regular space and time for local people to step back from dayto-day demands, and turn to God, in praise and worship, or simply being. But it also provides opportunities to do some things differently. To work together with people from sister churches so that we can help each other with ideas and support, in

living out our Christian calling in our different respective communities.

How do you feel about new beginnings? Are they occasions for sadness, lamenting what has been, and is now in the past? Times for thankfulness for all that was good in times past? Opportunities to look to the future, with both nervousness and excitement? Perhaps most likely a mixture of all of these. New beginnings remind us that although life might seem pretty static a lot of the time, the reality is that we live amidst constant change and growth. The good news for people of faith is that God is with us in it. Amongst my favourite Bible verses are these from Isaiah - But forget all that— it is nothing compared to what I am going to do. For I am about to do something new. See, I have already begun! Do you not see it? I will make a pathway through the wilderness. I will create rivers in the dry wasteland.

Isaiah 43.18-19, New Living Translation

'All that' refers to what has been said immediately before these words. God has been reminding his people of his mighty acts of the past, rescuing them out of slavery in Egypt. But that is as nothing, says God, to what He is about to do. The future does not negate the past – but simply looking to the past would mean missing out on the good that the future holds.

> Whether we're aware of it or not, September brings new beginnings for all of us, because life is always moving

forward. Whatever it is that's new that lies ahead of you, my hope and prayer for you is that it will be good, that you don't have to do it alone, and that you'll be able to embrace it – with gratitude for what has been, and openness to what is to come.

Refurbishment at St John's

That service was in our temporary home in the Village Institute. In a very different format, we started with bacon butties and coffee at 10am, followed by a lay-led service by Ruby at 11am. Tony Hamilton, the Cononley Singers conductor, taught us to sing "Happy Days", a favourite of Ruby's in the Singers repertoire. Ruby presented us with a very happy hour of laughter and prayer with readings as a celebration of the landmark that St John's had reached and the progress that has been made in the first few days towards the refurbishment.

Services will now be held at the Institute, with one or two exceptions when the Institute has already been booked. On those Sundays we will have the opportunity to join the services at Bradley or Kildwick.

In **September**, we will have no service on 1st September.

Holy Communion will be led by Revd Julie Bacon on 8th and 15th. There will be a lay led service on 22nd – and on 29th, the "fifth Sunday service" will be at Kildwick at 9.30.

On 6th **October** the annual Harvest Service will be led by Methodist minister, Revd Susan Greenhart.

Please pray for the ongoing refurbishment at St John's and for the builders carrying out this work.

Heritage Open Days

Facinating 1 Th

Welcome to England's largest festival of history and culture!

Every September some 40,000 volunteers across England organise 5.000 events to celebrate our fantastic history and culture.

feel priveleged to have had And three of those 5,000 events are at St Andrew's!

First and foremost, the church will be open for visitors on both weekends of the Festival (14th/15th and 21st/22nd September). Visitors will see our beautiful old building; they'll be shown some of our ancient artefacts and hear some of the history of the iconic building. They will also hear a little of what we are trying to do to preserve this "jewel in the crown of Craven" for future generations.

It may be that part of the bell tower will be included in a tour of the church. That's where you'll see a strange door, halfway up the wall – and that's where you'll be subjected to the one-eyed gaze of the supposed Norse god, Odin. But the bell tower is also a tour in its own right. The tower is officially only open on the first weekend (14th and 15th September) though there may be folk around for the second.

On the Tower Tour, visitors will see our ringing room, with its rare "Yorkshire Tail Ends" on the ropes (we're one of just six towers in the world with these). They will see how a bell "works" when rung English-style and will, no doubt, become bemused by the complexities of change ringing. The more intrepid will make their way up the spiral staircase (passing the back of that "fairy door" in the wall) to see the venerable clock which has been ticking there since at least 1709. Its present form dates from 1867 when it was set going on 24th August. Further up, across an awkward step, are the bells themselves; nearly three tons of metal. There is no doubt about it. The Nine Tailors has it right; these have an impressive and brooding presence all of their own.

Our third event is an innovation this year. This is an unique opportunity to cast a bell! Provided that the weather is kind (and the forecast suggests it may be!), we'll be firing up the furnace and doing some casting. I hope we'll be able to see how a big bell is cast, using traditional loam and a strickle but we'll actually cast in sand which works better for our small bells. This is a chance to get up close and personal! Apart from the actual pouring of the molten metal, visitors will have the chance to do it themselves! If it's raining, then there'll be a display of the equipment. We can make the moulds, but not actually pour the metal.

Do come along! If you know about the church, come and help! If you don't, then come and find out.

Old birds, new birds

For several years now the most dominant, and also the most colourful character amongst our varied garden birdlife, has been a cock pheasant. He used to have the habit of announcing his presence by crowing loudly while at the same time vigorously flapping his wings in an aggressive display to all other birds that he was not to be trifled with. When I went out in the evening to top up the bird feeders he would meet me as if to demand that he should be the first to be thrown some seed. He would then call up his little entourage of other pheasants to join in the supper.

But latterly the old pheasant has not been his usual self. He seems to have lost his companions apart from a single hen bird which turns up occasionally as if to check on his welfare, as a carer might do for a sick person. Otherwise he cuts a very lonely figure in our garden. He still comes out for his evening supper, but his demeanour is more of a supplication than a command. His plumage has lost its sheen and his call has diminished from a confident crow to something more like a subdued 'cluck' without any attendant display of wing-flapping. Maybe he

is just going through a periodic moult which must be quite a stressful time for him. In that case we may see him recover to something nearer his prime before long and hear him in full voice once more.

So that's our old bird. But we have had some new visitors from among the pigeon family which we have not previously recorded. We are used to seeing wood pigeons and collared doves and regard these as residents around and in the garden. Recently however these have been joined on a couple of occasions by a stock dove and separately by the more delicate and prettier turtle dove. We welcome all such newcomers – just like Cononley WI which regularly says the same in its reports in this magazine! 

Relate: Time to Talk



I am writing as a trustee on the board of Relate in Keighley asking whether you could think about making a donation to 'Time to Talk', as this part of Relate's work is close to my heart as a parent and fairly new grandparent, and having worked with deeply emotionally disturbed children in my last employment.

My reason for asking you to contribute is that the counselling we can offer for the many children with mental health difficulties is severely limited as a result of costs rising and funding decreasing. We have also suffered a loss of funding as a result of reduced demands on our room hire here at Acres House which in the past brought in £30K annually.

Statistics from the Children's Society website tell us that 4.1% of 5-10 year olds, 9% of 11-16 year olds and 15% of 17-19 year olds suffer from an identifiable emotional disorder which means they need help which 'Time to Talk' counselling with Relate can provide if the money is available.

We have highly qualified and experienced counsellors who can offer young clients the support which is continuing to be desperately needed, either at Relate here in Keighley or for some at the school which they attend but of course this only is available during term time.

We have a waiting list across the district of at least 50 youngsters at the moment, which means a long time without any help for so many of them when support is needed immediately.

I appreciate that everyone has varying demands made on their finances but please, if you feel this subject is a concern to you or any member of your family or friends, think about making a contribution to the 'Time to Talk' aspect of Relate's work.








The Prayer Page

The Birds in Your Garden

The Swallow





Swallows are often used as an indication of the changing seasons – "one swallow does not a summer make" etc. (Apparently from a remark by Aristotle). In September they tell us autumn is just around the corner as they feed up ready for their return to the warmer climes of Africa.

Swallows are characterised by their slender bodies, long pointed wings and forked tails, Martins tend to have much less deeply forked tails, but you do have to look closely to see which is which when they are chasing insects. Helpfully, whilst Swallows have a wide range of habitats, House Martins usually hunt near buildings, and Sand Martins near water.

There are around 800,000 breeding pairs in the UK, part of a total of more than 25m in Europe as a whole. They start laying in early June and can

continue into August, usually producing two broods per year. For many years they were amber listed, but recently this has been lifted to green as numbers seem to have stabilised or even grown. In Yorkshire though, their numbers have been falling steadily since 2010, to around half their peak.

No one seems really sure why this is, but the loss of livestock farming and grazed grassland, together with arable intensification, are the most likely causes. Loss of nesting sites, often blamed, seems not to be a major factor. Recent research has found a correlation between survival rates and rainfall in the western Sahal (the area just south of the Sahara) which they must pass through in spring on their way here. Add in the hazards of long-distance migration in a world afflicted by climate change, and the resultant unpredictable and high-energy driven weather, and you have a recipe for trouble.

Unlike other passerines, Swallows migrate by day, flying quite low in about 200 miles stages, stopping to refuel on flying insects. At night they roost in huge flocks in reed-beds at traditional stopover spots. Before crossing barriers, such

as the Sahara or the Mediterranean they will refuel for several days to ensure they have enough fat for the crossing. The amount of fat they lay down is closely correlated with the size of the next barrier as carrying excess fat is extremely costly in terms of impaired flight performance.

The journey to or from Africa takes about six weeks, with Swallows from different parts of Europe flying to different destinations. UK breeding Swallows winter in South Africa and Namibia, so they have a longer way to go than most. In spring, Swallows from all over the African continent cross the Mediterranean via Gibraltar or via the Balearics, Sardinia, and the Italian peninsula. They then spread out, with those headed for the UK continuing to northern France, Belgium and the Netherlands, where another split occurs, between birds breeding here, Denmark and Scandinavia. Their autumn return routes are similar to those in spring.

I find it quite incredible that such small birds travel so far to breed. Just how and why this high-risk behaviour evolved is the subject of much fascinating discussion and well worth reading about if you have the time.
